Walden Bello is the founding Director of the Global South, a policy research institute based in Bangkok, Thailand. He is also a Professor of Public Administration and Sociology at the University of the Philippines. Prior to that, he was Executive Director of the Institute for Food and Development Policy (Food First) in Oakland, California. A renowned campaigner for international justice and development and one of the leading independent critics of current global economic systems, he is the author and co-author of numerous books, including: *Deglobalization: Ideas for a New World Economy* (2004); *A Siamese Tragedy: Development and Disintegration in Modern Thailand* (1999); *Dark Victory: The United States, Structural Adjustment and Global Poverty* (1994); and *People and Power in the Pacific: The Struggle for the Post-Cold War Order* (1992). Bello was one of the 2003 recipients of Sweden's "Right Livelihood Award," known as the Alternative Nobel Prize.

Mo Vaziri is the Director of CSUSB's Center for Global Management, as well as a founding member of the International Finance Association, the American Finance Association, and the Business Association of Latin America. His areas of research are international finance, corporate profitability measurement, Latin America's external debt, international taxation, foreign country evaluation and analysis, and the European monetary system. He maintains strong intellectual and cultural ties to the Middle East.

Salaam Yousif's research interests are in cultural studies and non-Western literatures. He teaches courses in fiction and drama, non-Western literatures, and world literatures. He is an articulate advocate of improving communication between Middle Eastern and Western cultures.

David Yaghoubian's areas of specialization are Middle Eastern history, Islamic history, Iranian history, minorities in the Middle East, nationalism, as well as imperialism and colonialism. His recent publications focus on ethnicity, identity, and the relationship between nationalism and religion in the Middle East.

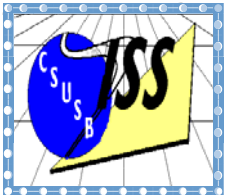

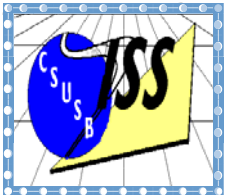

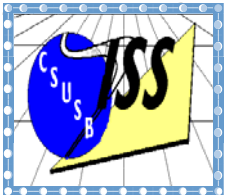
