In the early 17<sup>th</sup> century, Celebi was the first Muslim scholar to infuse European Renaissance ideas into his scholarship. His maps are a turning point in Turkish cartography. Marcus Smith and Blake Cotton two linguists who helped to codify the Serrano language, will describe their ongoing work.
